Jean Baptiste, a three-year-old colt owned by Mrs. Lloyd P. Tate of Starland Farm, finished 11th in a field of 17 in the 82nd running of the famed Kentucky Derby last Saturday.

Mrs. Tate's horse was ridden by jockey Jimmy Nichols of New York.

Asked here this week how she felt about the horse's showing, Mrs. Tate said: "Of course, an owner is never really completely pleased unless his horse wins or finishes a close second. But Jean Baptiste is a good horse and has been a winner in a number of other races this season and last year."

Last August Jean Baptiste finished third in the Hopeful, a race which Needles, winner of this year's Derby, also won.
