A former resident of Southern Pines, Mr. Olmsted was born at Coudersport June 21, 1877, son of Arthur George and Ellen Ross Olmsted. He studied law in the office of his father, an attorney who was a judge and served also as speaker of the Pennsylvania

House of Representatives. Mr. Olmsted first came to the Sandhills with his family as a Pinehurst winter visitor in 1910 In 1924, after four years of resihis permanent home at Southern Pines, building the house now owned by W. P. Saunders on Massachusetts Avenue extension. He and his family lived in Southern Pines from 1924 until they moved to Sanford in 1936.
