Bike Riders Are Warned Of Rules For Safe Driving

With the school year now in progress, Police Chief C. E. Newton today reminded all bicycle riders that certain rules and regulations will be strictly enforced. Chief Newton pointed up the following rules as being the most important: Riders cannot hold on to another vehicle (car, truck, bicycle) while riding a bike. No riding on handlebars or crossbars. No riding on sidewalks. No riding bikes the wrong direction on a one-way street. Riders must keep to the right, give proper hand signals and stop at all intersections.
