Shooting Was Accidental, Court Told; Local Youth Ordered Freed

Paul Propst, 19, of Southern Pines, was set free in Moore Recorder's Court Monday on charges of shooting his stepfather.

Propst, who was arrested by Southern Pines police after he had shot his stepfather with a .22 calibre rifle at the home here, was ordered released after the stepfather testified he thought the shooting was accidental.

Other cases disposed of Monday:
Augusta King, Jr., Addor, driving without operator's license, speeding, unlawful possession of seal-broken whiskey, guilty of driving without operator's license, not guilty of unlawful possession, \$25 and costs.

Donald Lee Needham, Robbins, careless and reckless driving, \$25 and costs.

John McKenzie, Jr., Cameron, speeding, prayer for judgment continued two years on payment of \$35 and costs.

Jerry Bogan, Pinehurst, careless and reckless driving, speeding, failure to stop, 30 days on roads, suspended on payment of \$30 and costs, defendant found not guilty on failure to stop.

John W. Hall, Fort Bragg, unlawful possession of seal-broken whiskey, 30 days on roads, suspended on payment of \$25 and costs.

Milton E. Swaney, Fort Bragg, driving drunk, careless and reckless driving, transporting seal-broken whiskey, 60 days on roads, suspended on payment of \$100 and costs, license revoked 12 months.

Russell Goins, Carthage, Public drunk, cursing, resisting arrest, three months on roads, suspended for 12 months on good behavior conditions and fine of \$50 and costs.

Mitzie Brown Allen, Route 2, Robbins, speeding 48 in 35 zone, prayer for judgment continued on payment of costs.

George Collins, violation of judgment. It appearing to court that Collins was ordered in December, 1955, to leave the county, at his own request, as part of a sentence, he has been back to the county many times during that period. A six months road sentence was put into effect.

Joe G. Rios, Fort Bragg, speeding, accident, \$25 and costs.

Sanford David Jones, driving drunk, careless and reckless driving, no operator's license, 60 days on roads, suspended on payment

of \$100 and costs, license revoked 12 months.

Charles Thomas Needham, Asheboro, speeding 70, careless and reckless driving, \$25 and costs.

Stacey Ritter, Pinehurst, public drunk, transporting seal-broken whiskey, 30 days on roads, suspended on payment of \$10 and costs.

James B. Moore, Bunnlevel, careless and reckless driving, accident, property damage and injury. Warrant amended to charge of excessive speed. Guilty of operating a car too fast, not guilty of careless and reckless driving, prayer for judgment continued on payment of fine of \$5 and costs and on condition defendant pay damage done to car and any medical expenses incurred, defendant filed notice of appeal to Superior Court, bond set at \$200.

Ronald F. Case, Fort Bragg, driving without operator's license, costs.

Paul Propst, Southern Pines, assault with a deadly weapon, causing serious injury. Court found that the assault was on the defendant's stepfather and that he and mother did not want to prosecute and that the stepfather does not know that the assault was made and believes he was shot as a result of an accident and that the shooting was not intentional. Prayer for judgment of the costs and on condition defendant be of good behavior for next two years and dispose of his gun and not keep any guns in or about the house.

Edward McMannen, Southern Pines, carnal knowledge of child, continued to Monday, September 17. Court ordered defendant released to return on that date for hearing.

Waverley Reed Ray, Biscoe, careless and reckless driving, accident, \$25 and costs.

Howard Edward Broadhead, Fort Bragg, driving on wrong side of road, transporting seal broken whiskey, \$25 to include costs.

William Jasper Black, West End, driving drunk, trespass, malicious destruction of property,

public drunk, worthless check, defendant entered pleas of not guilty on all charges except issuing worthless check. Found guilty on all charges, sentenced to four months on driving drunk, trespassing and malicious destruction of property charges, one month on public drunk charges, and one month on issuing worthless check charge, but court ordered last sentence suspended on payment of the check and costs. Defendant appealed to Superior Court, bond set at \$500.

Ashley Lee Dunn, Aberdeen, unlawful possession of tax paid whiskey, \$15 and costs.

The following judgments were handed down in a special term of Recorder's Court held September 1.

Lacy James Davis, Route 2, Seagrave, unlawful possession of illicit whiskey, 60 days on roads, suspended on payment of \$25 and costs.

John Rivers, Fort Bragg, using another's driver's license as his own, improper muffler, and James W. Tootle, Fort Bragg, allowing another to use his opera-

tor's license, joint fine of \$25 plus one-half the costs each.

Harrison Malloy, Aberdeen, assault with a deadly weapon, inflicting serious injury, eight months on the roads, suspended on payment of costs and on payment of \$15 each month to Clerk of Court for next 12 months to be used as payment of hospital bills of plaintiff. Notice of appeal filed, bond set at \$350.

John Smith, non-compliance allowing his dogs to run at large, capias issued, returnable September 10.

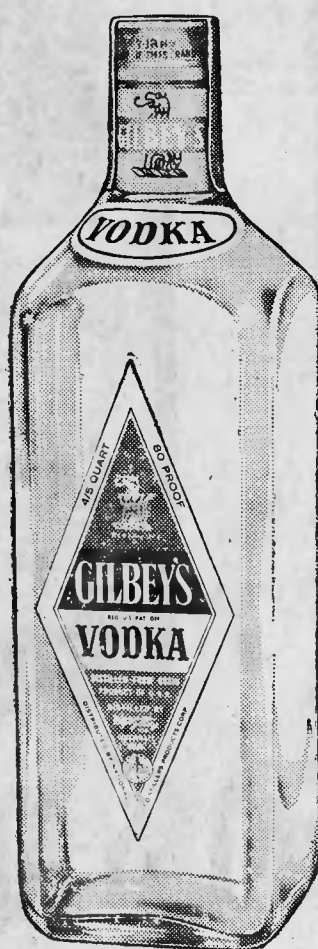

Farmers Should File For Gasoline Refunds

The North Carolina Farm Bureau reminded farmers this week to file their federal tax refunds on farm-used gasoline. The deadline is October 1.

Farm Bureau Executive Vice President R. Flake Shaw said many farmers eligible for this refund have not made application for it.

A charge of three cents in federal tax is made on each gallon of gasoline. This is the first year that farmers who use gasoline in farm machinery have been exempt from it.

Farmers should file for the refund through the office of P. K. Sanders, Greensboro, director of internal revenue for the North Carolina district.
