W. H. Barber, county dog warden, said this week that several very valuable dogs from different sections of the county had been reported missing by their owners. Many of them are valuable hunting dogs, he said. The rest are pets.

Barber said that anyone find-

ing a dog should call his office (Carthage 3153) and report them.

that buying a dog can sometimes be a dangerous thing. Be absolutely sure, he said, that before you hand over any money, you know definitely that the person selling the dog is the real owner.

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
