

## GOP Flayed By Kitchin In West End Rally; Other Demo Meetings Listed

Speaking at a Democratic rally in the West End School auditorium Monday night, A. Paul Kitchin, Democratic nominee for Congress from the 8th district told his listeners that: "We are not over the hump. We have a lot of work to do. But, if we will work hard and dig deep we can win and we can win overwhelmingly."

"Stevenson and Kefauver are candidates of the little man and the average man. We have candidates who represent Joe Smith and Mary Smith," he said, adding that "We have got a job to do and its getting later than we think it is."

Speaking of President Eisenhower, Kitchin said: "He can't lead his own party. . . I feel sorry for Eisenhower but I don't feel sorry enough to vote for him. . . Tom Dewey and others are writing his speeches. . . I don't believe he had the opportunity to read over his Lexington, Ky., speech."

Kitchen was introduced by W. Lamont Brown of Southern Pines, chairman of the Moore County Democratic Executive Committee who presided over most of the session. W. E. Graham of Jackson Springs, chairman of the West End Precinct Committee called the meeting to order and welcomed the group and introduced members of the local precinct committee. Billed as a joint rally of the Bensalem and West End precincts, the audience was about evenly divided from the two precincts.

Among others making short talks were Solicitor M. G. Boyette, H. Clifton Blue of Aberdeen, Mayor Voit Gilmore of Southern Pines, Mrs. John L. Frye of Robbins, T. Roy Phillips of Carthage and J. Hawley Poole of West End.

## Scouts Plan Two-Day Astronomy Camporee Friday

Astronomy will be the central theme of the fall camporee of the Moore District Boy Scouts, which gets underway at the Pinehurst Field Trial area on Midland Road tomorrow (Friday) at 4 p. m.

Under the general direction of David Drexel, chairman of the district camping activities committee, the two day camporee is expected to draw approximately 100 Boy Scouts.

The field trial area is about one and one-half miles from the Southern Pines City limits.

Drexel, who has spent countless hours with Scouts recently constructing a telescope for use in the camporee, said a star navigation expert from the Air Force Air-Ground Operation School would also be on hand to instruct.

Astronomy merit badges may be earned during the two-day

program, according to Frank Yandell, Moore scout executive. The camporee will be over about 8 a. m. Sunday morning. Drexel said the object of the camporee would be to "show that the sky is not a roof but an immense 180 degree picture window."

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
