Head Asks Help  
In Refugee Work**

A final appeal to American citizens to help sponsor refugees from the Netherlands who desire to come to the United States under the Refugee Relief Program is being made through the Governor's Committee for the Refugee Relief Program.

Mrs. Walter B. Cole, Moore County superintendent of public welfare, said the program would expire December 31.

She said the jobs and living accommodations are needed for Dutch refugees whose cases are already in process and who can arrive within a short time if assured work and shelter when they get here.

"This is the final opportunity for citizens of Moore County, as well as the rest of the state, to give their support to the program," she said this week. "We are being asked to provide assistance for these people and I am sure that many will meet this call. No local paper work is required in the cases already started. All we need is personal assurance that the job and living place will be ready when the refugees get here."

The Netherlands government provides transportation to the destination, expense money to pay initial living costs upon arrival, a comprehensive health and accident insurance policy for three months and permission for the refugees to transfer personal funds to this country.

A wide variety of occupational skills is represented in the refugee group.

Monday—Sliced luncheon meat, mustard and catsup, sandwich bread, butter, buttered potatoes, baked squash au gratin, milk and cookie.

Tuesday—Orange, chili burger on bun, whipped potatoes, whole kernel corn, milk.

Wednesday — Toasted cheese sandwich, beef-vegetable soup, saltines and butter, halloween cake, milk.

Thursday — Vienna sausage, baked beans, tossed green salad, cherry jello, whipped topping, milk.

Friday—Oven fried perch fillet, buttered rice, string beans, cole slaw, wheat bread and butter, milk.

The South accounts for 40.2 per cent of the wood cut from sawtimber trees, says the U. S. Forest Service's recent Timber Resource Review, compared with 46.0 per cent for the West and 13.8 per cent for the North. The softwood percentages of those cuts are: West—99.6 per cent; North 17.7 per cent and South—59.8 per cent; with southern yellow pines comprising 96.9 per cent of the Southern softwood total.

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
