PUBLIC NOTICE
Public notice is hereby given that the Town Council of the Town of Southern Pines do enact an ordinance amending the Building Code ordinance relative to awnings and signs as follows:

BE IT ORDAINED AND ESTABLISHED BY THE TOWN COUNCIL OF THE TOWN OF SOUTHERN PINES AT REGULAR SESSION ASSEMBLED THIS THE 13th DAY OF NOVEMBER, 1956, AS FOLLOWS:

Section I. In Chapter N (Building Code) include and add a Section 32 to read as follows:

Section 32. That no person shall erect, project or suspend over the sidewalks of the Town, or any portion thereof, any sign, shed, awning or other structure, unless same shall be erected under the supervision of the Building Inspector and except upon written building permit issued by the Building Inspector. Any such sign, shed, awning or other structure shall be securely fastened, and shall be not less than seven feet above the sidewalk at any point.

Existing violations will be given twenty-four (24) months to comply from the date of the adoption of this ordinance.

Section II. In Chapter J (Public Nuisances) delete Section 4 (Awnings and Signs Over Sidewalk).

Section III. Any person violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall upon conviction thereof be subject to either a fine of not more than \$50.00 or imprisonment not exceeding 30 days, or both. Each and every days violation of this ordinance shall constitute a separate offense.

Section IV. Adopted this the 13th day of November, 1956.

NOTICE OF PUBLIC HEARING ON LEVY OF ASSESSMENT TO INSTALL PERMANENT STREET IMPROVEMENTS
