**Two From Area Are Winners Of Talent For Service Award**

State College students receiving "Talent for Service" scholarships include James W. Prim III, son of Mr. and Mrs. James W. Prim, Jr., of Southern Pines, and Wilbur Ray Creed, son of Mr. and Mrs. Raymond W. Creed of Aberdeen, it was announced this week by college officials.

Prim received a scholarship worth \$500 for his first year of study; Creed was granted a Textron Foundation scholarship as a result of the talent for service competition.

Principal purpose of the awards is to recognize top ranking graduates of the State's high schools who need some assistance to attend college. The Development Council launched the scholarship program four years ago when it learned that less than one third of the State's most talented high school graduates attend college, while there are six to 10 jobs open to each State College graduate at this time.

"Talent for Service" committees in each of the state's 100 counties accept and screen the recommend applicants from each high school for final processing. The scholarships are awarded on the basis of "scholastic promise, leadership potential, financial need, and interest in a field of study offered at State College."

**New Ford With A Retractable Top To Be Shown Here**

The first revolutionary idea in automotive design since the development of the closed car some 40 years ago has been unveiled by the Ford Motor Company. It is a hardtop model with a fully retractable steel top which, at the touch of a button, slides automatically into the car's trunk, according to Nolly Jackson, of Jackson Motors, Inc.

The new car combines the advantages of both a hardtop and a convertible.

Publication today of photographs of a finished model of the Ford Retractable ended nearly five years of secrecy. In that time, according to Jackson, Ford's stylists and engineers perfected a design which has been a long-sought goal of the auto industry. The six passenger two door car is scheduled for production starting in January and will be sold by Ford dealers.

Operation of the Retractable is deceptively simple: an instrument panel button is touched to raise or lower the steel top. Electric motors do the rest in a matter of seconds.

When the driver touches the top button, electric locks are released in the trunk lid and it rises up and back out of the way. Then locks are automatically released in the top, which swings up, back and down into the trunk. The trunk lid closes and locks itself. In 40 seconds, the car has been converted from closed hardtop sedan to an open-air vehicle.

To change it back again, the top button needs only to be moved in the opposite direction.
