(Continued from page 1) the School Board, in regard to an incident concerning his son, William McDonald, and Mr. Irie Leonard, Principal of the High School, Mr. Howarth discussed the matter with Mr. McDonald and suggested that he could bring the matter before the School Board at its meeting on Wednesday night. He also recommended that he talk with Mr. A. C. Dawson, Superintendent, the next day.

"The Superintendent started an immediate investigation on Wednesday morning, November 14, and along with the Chairman of the Board has continued to investigate the matter up to the present time. The Superintendent and Chairman have kept the other members of the Board fully informed. The school officials have conferred daily with Mr. Leonard and other interested parties.

"On Wednesday, November 14, Mr. McDonald, Mr. Howarth and Mr. Dawson had a very cordial and helpful discussion of the matter for more than an hour in the Superintendent's office. After the discussion the school officials requested Mr. McDonald to confer with them again after talking with his wife. Mr. McDonald stated that he would do so. However, Mr. and Mrs. Mc-Donald elected to take the matter out of the hands of the school officials and to place it in the court.

"On Monday night, November 19, the Superintendent went to the home of Mr. and Mrs. McDonald and discussd the matter for more than an hour. He again suggested that the matter be handled by the School Board.

"The Superintendent and the Board are fully aware of the problems of discipline in the schools and are greatly concerned about the present and future implications in this incident. With this in mind, we have attempted to handle this matter so as to protect the best interest of everyone concerned."

This is the text of the statement released by the board yesterday (Wednesday) morn-

"The Superintendent and Southern Pines City Board of Education have conducted a diligent and continuous investigation of the incident involving William McDonald and Mr. Irie Leonard, Principal of the Southern Pines High School, since the time the matter was brought to their attention.

"The investigation indicates that Mr. Leonard exercised his best judgment in dealing with the problem and that he did what he considered was necessary at the time to maintain order. The investigation further revealed that the punishment administered was not immoderate.

"Mr. Leonard is a good teacher and conscientious administrator. The Superintendent and School Board have always supported all teachers in matters pertaining to good discipline while not condoning any practice which is not in the best interest of the child and the school."
