

Westmoreland In Prison For Year; Faces Count Here

Robert Lee Westmoreland, Brooklyn, N. Y. Negro who stole a car here last November and is also wanted here for stabbing his wife in West Southern Pines, has been sentenced to a year in prison, after trial in Federal court on a charge of inter-state transpor-

tation of the stolen auto. According to information received from the local police department, Westmoreland was arrested in New Jersey while driving a stolen automobile owned by W. L. Baker of Southern Pines. He was tried and convicted in the U. S. District court at Newark, N. J. recently.

On release from Federal prison, it is expected Westmoreland will be returned here to face a charge of assault with a deadly weapon with intent to kill.

His wife, the stabbing victim, told investigating officers last November that Westmoreland had told her he came here by train to get her to go back to Brooklyn with him or kill her if she would not go.

After he stabbed her, he stumbled and fell, allowing her to get away and shut herself in the house from which he had dragged her, she told officers.
