In the same manner in which the director creates his special brand of film magic, he took his cameras to the actual New York City locales of the story; cafeterias, apartments, clubs, offices, streets and subways are seen in the film. Henry Fonda and Vera Miles play the roles of two people caught in an amazing web of mistaken identity.

This is Mr. Fonda's initial performance under Mr. Hitchcock.

Coming Sunday through Tuesday, is a return engagement in the Sandhills of that most pleasing "mother and daughter" story, "Teenage Rebel," adapted from the Broadway stage success "A Roomful of Roses," starring Ginger Rogers, Michael Rennie, Betty Lou Keim and Warren Berlinger, the latter two having had the same roles in the stage production.

Indications of its title to the contrary, this slick problem play has no truck with juvenile delinquency, but finds its theme in that old standard situation concerning divorced parents of an only child. The teenagers seen here are orderly, mannerly, convention-abiding young folks who behave perfectly, and meet their problems squarely, like young ladies and gentlemen. They project healthy, normal, youthful exuberance rather than the malicious, destructive characteristics that have supplied the foundations for numerous recent photoplays.

Starting Wednesday, Feb. 27, matinee and night, is the much talked-about attraction, "Baby Doll" from the story of Tennessee Williams, starring Karl Malden, Carroll Baker and Eli Wallach, which we regret to announce comes under the head of a "strictly adult" picture.

Bishop Penick To Speak At Village Chapel On Sunday

The Right Reverend Edwin A. Penick, D. D., Bishop of the Episcopal Diocese of North Carolina, will be guest preacher at the Village Chapel in Pinehurst Sunday.

Among his many distinctions is a service of 35 years as a Bishop of the Episcopal Church, a record of service that makes him the senior active member of the House of Bishops.

He has served as a member of the National Council of Churches, has been State Chairman of the North Carolina Commission on Inter-racial Cooperation, Presi-

dent of the North Carolina Council of Churches, and vice-president of the American Church Institute for Negroes.

A frequent visitor to the Sandhills, Bishop Penick lives in Raleigh.
