It is not often that a gallery can boast as interesting an exhibit as that now on view at the Library Gallery.

Here we have two sets of paintings, one by a father and one by his daughter. Local admirers of Emily Forrest's work can now nod a wise head and think: "Of course. Look what an artist her father was."

Heredity plays its part, it would seem-or can do so if given the chance by the hard work and perseverence that any creative effort needs, and which this daughter obviously supplied.

Mrs. Forrest's work is well known in this area. Her ethereal portraits of children, catching the elusive fairy-like quality of babyhood, have won her much acclaim. Outstanding among these canvases in this respect is "Water Baby," the small painting of the laughing child, against a backdrop of dashing breakers on a beach. In the same vein of infant joy is the "Study of Child," showing perhaps the same little fellow, arms raised over his head, bare tummy exposed to view below his blue bib, ecstatic grin on his face.
