Accompanying Moore's detailed report, in which every person who worked in the drive was listed, was the statement that the report "would serve as a means of conveying to the people of Moore County an adequate conception of the scope of work done by the Colored citizens . . ."

The completed totals were as follows:

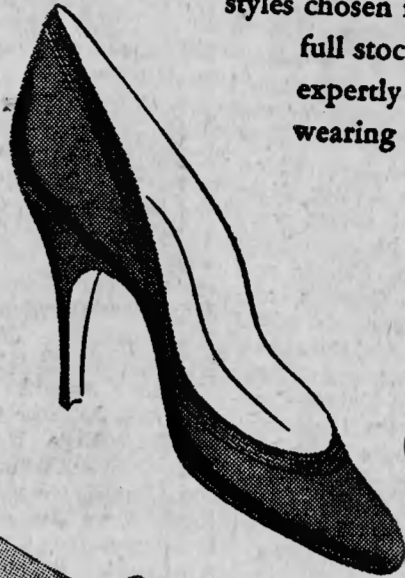

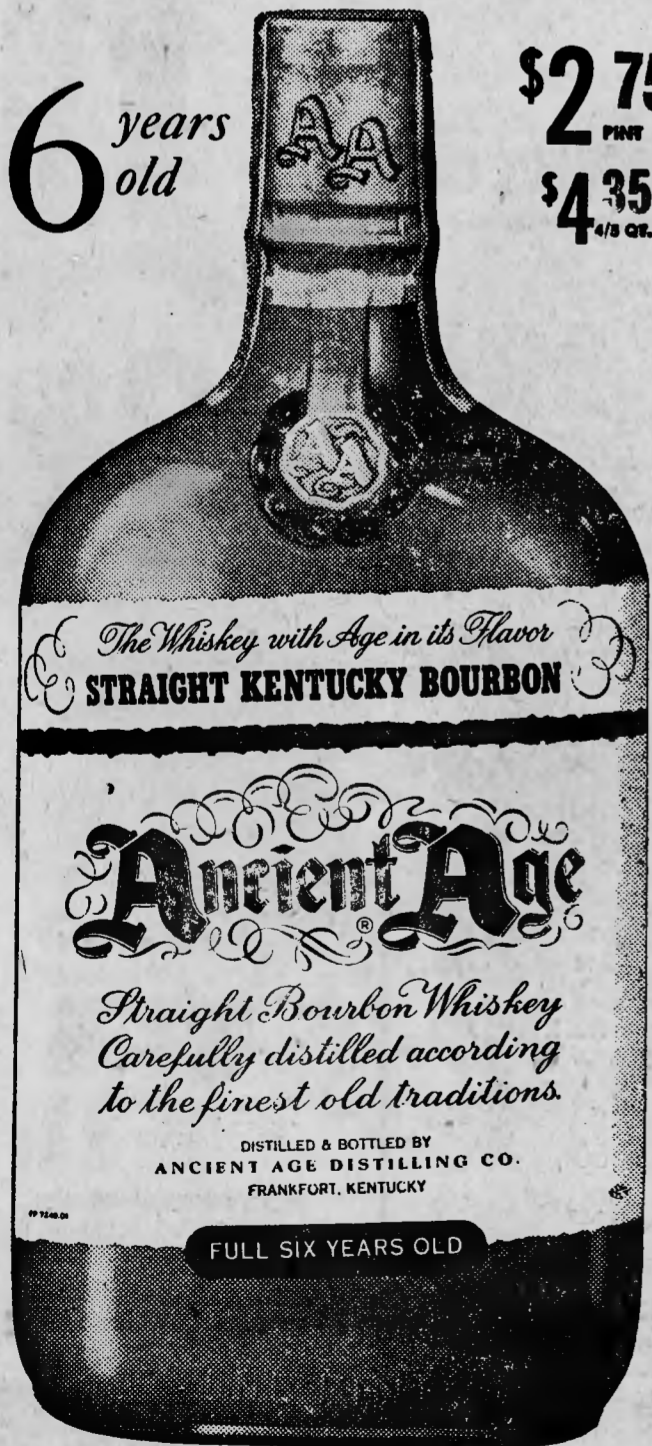
