In The General Assembly

Aberdeen Bill . . . On Thursday of last week I introduced a bill to increase the territorial jurisdiction of the police of the Town of Aberdeen so as to give the Aberdeen policemen authority to police the Karagheusian Mill property. The bill was requested by Mayor Medlin and the Aberdeen town commissioners.

Southern Pines . . . On last Friday, at the request of the Southern Pines Town Council, I introduced a bill to validate deeds of conveyance executed by the Town of Southern Pines for real or personal property executed prior to January 1, 1957.

On Subcommittee . . . Chairman Venters of the House Appropriations Committee and Chairman Eagle of the Senate Appropriations Committee on Tuesday named the joint subcommittee to study and bring in their recommendations on the general appropriations bill. Your representative was one of the 15 House members and 10 members of the Senate named to the committee. It is a most important committee which will handle the appropriations for all the state's needs. It is my feeling that it will take this committee about two or three weeks to bring in its

report.

For some of the children from far parts of the state it is necessary for them to spend the night in Raleigh. From some sections of the state, Raleigh is a greater distance than Washington, D. C., from Moore County.

Busy Week . . . This has been quite a busy week and there will not be much let-up before adjournment.

Insurance . . . On Wednesday the hearing was held on the Unsatisfied Claims Judgment Fund Bill introduced in the House by Reps. Hill, Powe and myself, and in the Senate by several Senators.

Psychologists . . . On this Fri-

day, April 19, a public hearing will be held on the bill introduced in the house by Reps. Umstead, Hill, Powe and myself and in the senate by Senators Jordan and Thomas to provide for the certification of psychologists. We are expecting a delegation from Moore County to appear in behalf of this bill.
