

Dr. George Matheson, Retired Dean Of St. John's Law School, Passes

Dr. George W. Matheson, 63, dean emeritus of St. John's University School of Law in Brooklyn, died at his home here Monday. He had been ill for some time.

Dr. Matheson, who spent almost half his life at St. John's, was co-founder of the university's law school with Judge Philip A. Brennan.

Several weeks ago he and Mrs. Matheson purchased the Andrews Estate on Connecticut Avenue. Previously, he had lived in Knollwood. He retired here several years ago because of ill health.

Funeral services are being held tonight (Thursday) at the Fairchild Funeral Chapel in Brooklyn. Burial will be Friday in Evergreen Cemetery in Brooklyn.

Mrs. Matheson is the former Constance dePool of New York, who was a former law student of his.

Dr. Matheson was born in Glasgow, Scotland, in 1894. He was brought to this country by his parents, Donald and Catherine Matheson, when he was only three years old.

He earned his BA Degree at Columbia in 1914; his LL.B. from St. Lawrence University Law School in 1917, and an LL.D. from St. John's in 1926.

He was admitted to the New York Bar in 1917 and practiced in Brooklyn. He was principal of the YMCA Prep School in Brooklyn from 1914 to 1917 and a professor of law at Brooklyn Law School for the next eight years before becoming dean and co-founder of St. John's Law School.

His clubs were Columbia University, Cherry Valley Club, Pinehurst Country Club, and the St. Andrews Society.

He wrote Principles of Law in Agency in 1921; Cases of Law of Agency in 1922; Cases on Law of Damages in 1922; and Cases and Material on the Law of Evidence in 1949.

HOW TO USE A VOTING MACHINE:

- (1) Move the Red Handle to the right. This closes the curtains.
- (2) Turn down a Voting Lever over the name of each candidate for whom you wish to vote. You may vote only for five.
- (3) Move the Red Handle to the left. This opens the curtains and registers the vote.
