THEATRES CAROLINA

Coming to the Carolina Theatre this Friday-Saturday is the return of Ingrid Bergman, in "Paris Does Strange Things," an entertaining and exciting story of a Polish princess trying to make one man president of France.

In this brilliantly produced and acted comedy-drama, Miss Bergman performs with charm, beauty and a fine understanding of the histrionic demand her role makes upon her talents; Mel Ferrer as the pursuing lover, gives a characterization of wide appeal, while Jean Marais, as the war general acts his role with vigor and clarity.

Filmed in Technicolor, it is a strikingly beautiful and lavishly costumed production, in which Miss Bergman appears in a widely contrasted comedy role and wears striking gowns.

Coming Sunday through Tuesday (three days only) is that uniquely conceived and expensively executed, "Designing Woman," a gay and costly contribution in CinemaScope and MetroColor. The picture has the gilt-edged names of Gregory Peck and Lauren Bacall, who respond with relish to the diverting incidents expertly directed by Vincente Minnelli.

The two stars, aided by Dolores Gray, let themselves go in a mad-and-merry comedy romp—and the result is delightful, often hilarious entertainment. The picture had been scheduled as a starring vehicle for Grace Kelly, before she decided to become Princess of Monaco. Actually, the more sophisticated Miss Bacall is better suited to the role and turns in a fine acting job—one of her best.

The attraction for Wednesday and Thursday, May 8-9, is the re-issue of that suspenseful adventure, "A Stranger On The Train," starring Farley Granger and Ruth Roman.

SUNRISE

"Heaven Knows, Mr. Allison," a unique and intriguingly paradoxical film co-starring Deborah Kerr and Robert Mitchum, will have its local premier on Sunday at the Sunrise Theatre. John Huston, whose formidable array of superlative pictures include such productions as "Treasure of Sierra Madre," "The African Queen" and "Moulin Rouge," directed this Twentieth Century-Fox CinemaScope

DeLuxe color production.

Charles Shaw's best-selling novel of the same title provided the story for this production, which Buddy Adler, executive production head of Twentieth Century-Fox, and Eugene Frenke, independent producer, worked on for nearly five years before they were able to get the perfect combination they wanted—Director John Huston, Miss Kerr for the role of the nun, "Sister Angela," and Mitchum as "Corporal Allison."

"Heaven Knows, Mr. Allison" tells the strange and moving story of a gentle nun and a tough Marine stranded on an island in the South Pacific under hazardous wartime conditions. It is packed with physical action, yet it is primarily a drama of human and spiritual emotions played with infinite delicacy and moving tenderness against the counterpart of the violence of war.
