John F. Buchholz of Southern Pines, whose name is synonymous with blood donor in this county, was commended for his untiring efforts in that direction last week as the directors of Moore Memorial Hospital approved a resolution expressing their appreciation for his contributions.

Buchholz, who lost a leg during World War 2 and received many transfusions afterwards, has for many years been dedicating his time toward developing an active blood donor program in Moore County. He is currently serving as assistant chairman of the Bloodmobile program.

In the past he has headed the Red Cross blood donor program and has worked closely with the two area hospitals in securing donors whenever the need arose.
