Services Held

Tragedy hit this community with a severe blow Tuesday when Mrs. Clifton Tuttle, 42, was fatally injured in an automobile accident near Latta, S. C. Rev. Mr. Tuttle was seriously injured with back and other internal injuries. He was hospitalized at Dillon, S. C., and was moved Sunday morning to Baptist Hospital in Winston-Salem. The Tuttle family was driving to Myrtle Beach for a vacation with their three sons, who were only slightly shaken, when the accident occurred. Funeral services were held Thursday for Mrs. Tuttle, the former Miss Toy Deal, at 10:30 with the Rev. Wade McKnight, of Rockingham, and the Rev. C. H. Kincaid of Lenoir, and the Rev. Bernard Tuttle of Lenoir officiating.

Graveside services were conducted at the Blue Ridge Memorial Park in Lenoir at 4 o'clock in the afternoon.

Mrs. Tuttle is survived by her husband; five children: Mrs. Vernon Price of Rockingham; Sherrie, a student at Appalachian State Teachers College at Boone; and Douglas, Steven, and Blaine of the home; and two brothers, Clyde Deal of Lenoir and Jasper Deal of Fayetteville.

Winners in the Poultry Show will be recognized and receive their prize money in the auditorium. Cash prizes are offered in several classes in both contests.

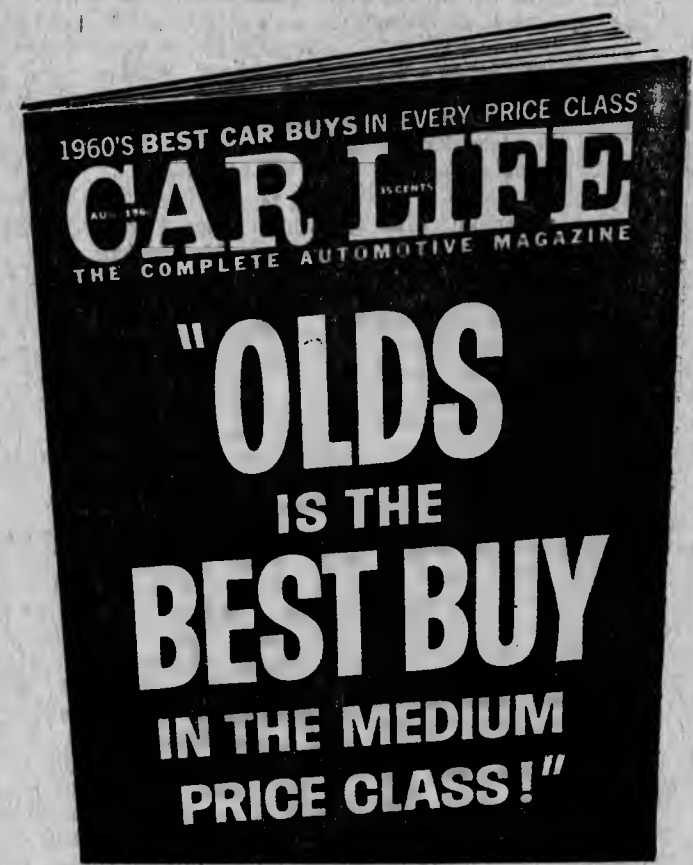
Show Chairmen

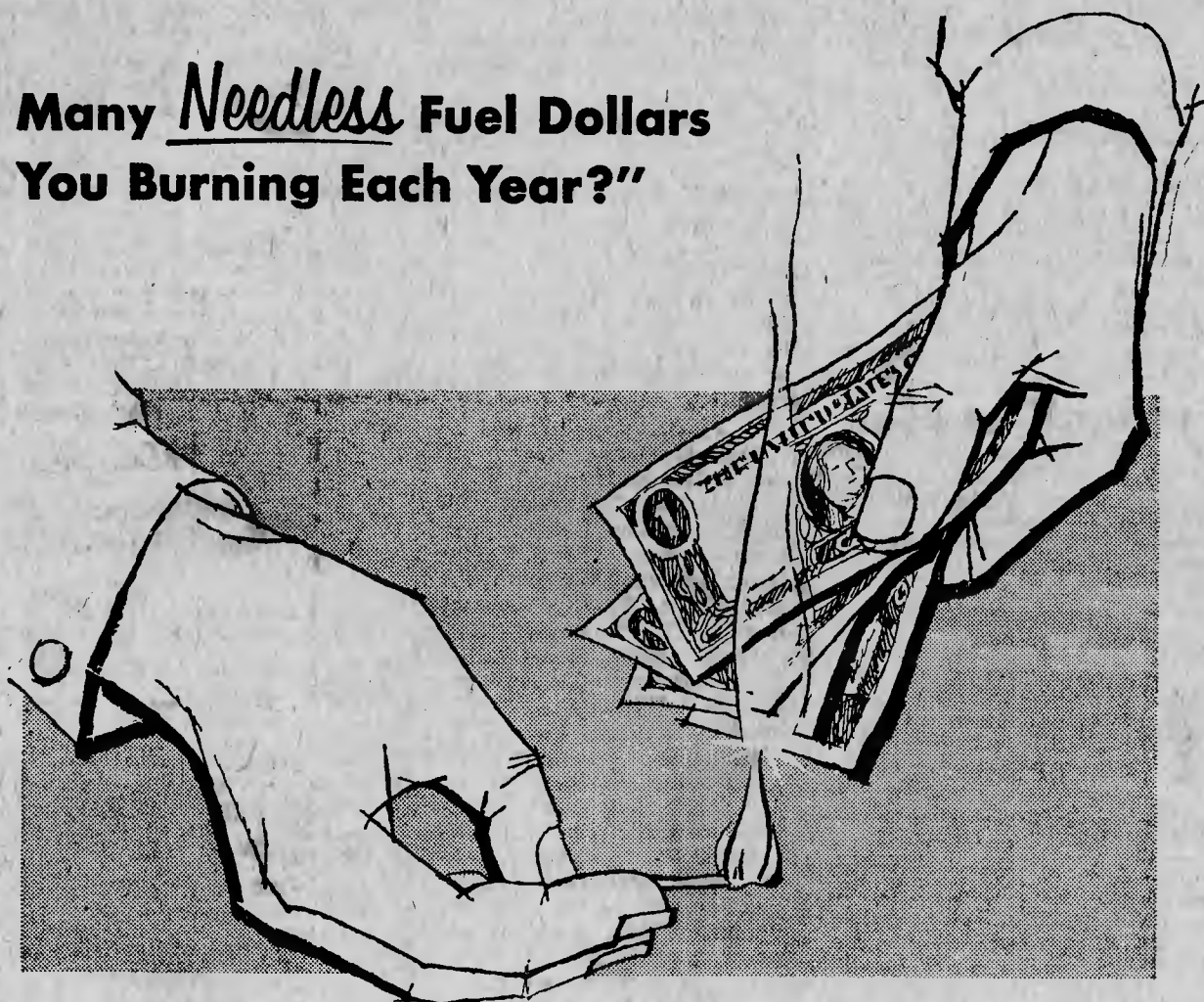
