Broadway Given 2-Year Suspended Sentence in Labor Day Shooting Case

Forrest Broadway, 61-year-old West Southern Pines resident, was given a two-year suspended prison term by Judge W. Harry Fullenwider in Southern Pines Recorder's Court last week. He also was taxed with the costs on a gambling count.

Broadway was charged with assault with a deadly weapon with intent to kill in the Labor Day shooting of William Thomas (Tommy) Wade, also of West Southern Pines.

The shooting followed what police described as a drinking bout and gambling session. Wade was shot in the back in the kitchen of his home.

Broadway's two-year sentence was suspended for four years on payment of the costs and the doctor and hospital bills incurred by Wade. Also a condition of the suspended sentence was that he not be convicted of a similar offense for four years and he was placed under supervision of the probation officer for two years.

Wade, now recovered, paid the costs in the same court session last week on a gambling charge and appealed to Superior Court on a conviction of possession of and selling non-taxpaid liquor.

Wade's sentence on the liquor charge was one year on the roads suspended for two years on payment of the costs and on condition that he not be convicted of a similar offense in two years. He also was placed under supervision of the probation officer. Bond for his appeal was set at \$100.

Ragan, Chapel Hill, speeding 45 in 35 zone, \$10 and costs; Ralph Junior McCoy, Manly, possession of seal-broken whiskey, \$10 and costs; George Godwin, possession of whiskey for purpose of sale, 12 months on roads, suspended five years on payment of \$200 and costs, not to be convicted of similar offense in five years; Edward C. Patterson, Jr., Route 2, Vass, 23 years old, carnal knowledge of female under 16, not guilty plea entered, probable cause found, defendant to be held for grand jury, bond set at \$1,000; same defendant, paternity of illegitimate child, continued until after birth

of child.

Bullens, Route 2, Vass, speeding 45 in 35 zone, carrying concealed weapon (pistol), \$10 and costs; Joe Leonard Watson, Sanford, speeding 75 in 60 zone, \$15 and costs; John Wayne McNeill, Cameron, speeding 72 in 50 zone, \$12 and costs; Norman M. Calcutt, speeding, improper equipment (muffler), judgment continued on payment of costs; Walter Odell Frye, careless and reckless driving, accident \$15 and costs; David B. Webb, Aberdeen, careless and reckless driving, one month suspended one month on payment of \$25 and costs, not to operate motor vehicle for one month; John Robinson, 490 Carlisle St., improper equipment causing accident, \$10 and costs, car not to be operated until it has been inspected by the State Highway Patrol or the Southern Pines Police Department; Donald Eugene Boyer, Route 7, Sanford, speeding 70 in 55 zone, \$15 and costs.

Three defendants paid \$10 and costs on public drunk charges, in separate cases: Anthony Morton, Jr., Fort Bragg; Robert A. Vocker, Fort Bragg; and Luther L. Harrington, Jackson Hamlet.

Charged with gambling and using vile and profane language, four defendants were each sentenced to one month on the roads, suspended for 12 months on payment of \$10 and costs, each not to be convicted of similar offense in 12 months. They were Melvin Stuckey, Phillip G. McLellan, Curtis L. Wade and Mackie Lee Stubbs.

Not pros with leave was taken in the case charging Bobby Lee Tew, 23, with fornication and adultery. The same defendant, charged with assault on a female, was also found guilty of engaging in an affray and was sentenced to one month, suspended for 12 months on payment of the costs and on condition he not go on the premises of the complainant, his wife, Mrs. Swaine Coleen Tew without written invitation and also that he not telephone, molest or threaten her nor be found in the company of the complainant.

The same sentence and conditions were handed down in the case of Mrs. Ina Mae Tew, mother of Bobby Lee Tew, who was charged by Mrs. Swaine Coleen Tew with assault on female.

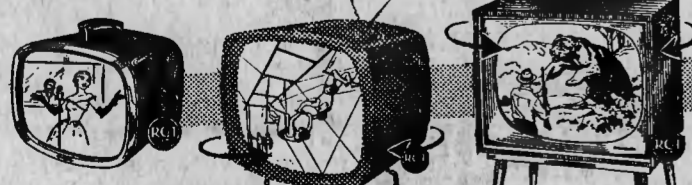
