D. McCrimmon Of Lakeview Dies; Rites Held Today

Duncan McCrimmon, 70 died Tuesday at his home in Lakeview. Funeral services were held this (Thursday) afternoon at Lakeview Presbyterian Church, conducted by the Rev. Grover Currie of West End, former pastor, assisted by the pastor, the Rev. Dan Norman. Graveside services followed at Union Church cemetery in charge of Southern Pines Masonic Lodge No. 484, of which he was a

member. Mr. McCrimmon, who was widely known in the Sandhills, was born in Cumberland County, in a section which later became Moore. He formerly owned and operated the Aberdeen Supply Co., a feed and seed business at Aberdeen, and was the owner of considerable property in the area, including Lake Bay.
