15 Prizes in 5 Age Groups Offered in Boys' Football Contest Here Saturday

Fifteen prizes in five age groups will be offered to boys six through 10 years of age in the Punt, Pass and Kick football competition to be staged at Memorial Field at 2 p. m. Saturday.

There will be first prizes of football uniforms, second prizes of warm-up jackets and third prizes of footballs for boys in each of the age groups—six, seven, eight, nine and 10 years old. Skill in punting, passing and place-kicking will be tested.

Tom Ruggles, Joe Kimball and Joel Stutts were named this week as judges for the contests. John W. Williams, high school athletic coach is the director of the competition.

The public is invited. The contests are part of a nation-wide program sponsored by the Ford Division of the Ford Motor Company, in cooperation with the National Football League and sponsored locally by Jackson Motors. Boys may register for the contests up to noon Saturday at Jackson Motors on Old No. 1 highway, south.

In addition to winning the football uniform first prizes, the most skilled boys in each group also will be in the running for an appearance at one of the home games of the Washington Red-

skins when regional winners will punt, pass and kick in an elimination to determine the five national champions. Scores from every P. P. and K. competitor in this area will be compared, and the best competitor in each age group chosen for the elimination appearance at the Washington Redskins game.

The competition will culminate

with the choosing of five national champions who will be given a reception at the White House and attend the National Football League championship game with their fathers.

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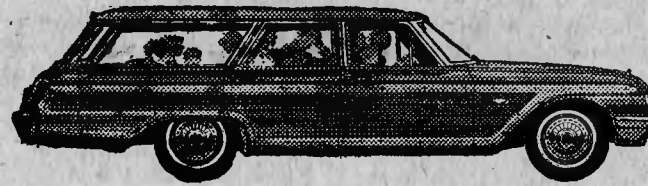

Benjamin Lynch Succumbs at 89

Benjamin P. Lynch, 89, of Southern Pines died Thursday of last week. Rosary services were held at Powell Funeral Home Sunday and requiem mass was offered Monday at 10 a. m. at St.

Anthony's Catholic Church by the pastor, the Rev. Francis M. Smith. Burial followed in Mt. Hope Cemetery.

A native of Albany, N. Y., he was an executive with the New York Central railway, moving to Southern Pines in 1956 following his retirement.

Several Unusual Cases Heard Monday In Moore Recorder's Court, Carthage

Don Smith of Southern Pines faced trial in Moore County Recorder's Court Monday for engaging in electrical work without a license, probably the first time such an offense had come up in that court.

Judgment was continued for Smith on payment of \$25 and costs, and on condition he reimburse his customer. Wilbert McDonald, for money McDonald had to pay another electrician to fix the wiring so it would pass inspection. The defendant was also ordered not to engage in electrical contracting till he first obtains the proper and required license.

Fred Shields McDuffie of Robbins, charged with drunken driving, was found not guilty, but was convicted instead on an amended warrant on the charge of driving a car with a loud and defective muffler. Judgment was continued for him, on payment of costs.

Robert Williams of Sanford was acquitted on a charge of allowing livestock—to wit, goats—to run at large and destroy crops.

In another unusual situation, Rochelle Cole, Negro, of Carthage, who had twice failed to appear when called as a prosecuting witness in an assault case, said he had had no subpoena nor any other notice he was supposed to be in court. The three defendants were dismissed last week on a nol pros with leave when Cole was absent for the second time, and a hearing was set for this Monday for him to show cause why the prosecution should not be found to be frivolous and malicious, and he taxed with costs. On hearing his story the court decided it could find no frivolity or malice, and directed the solicitor to investigate the case further, to see if it should not be reinstated for trial.

Otherwise, except for a case involving sale of illicit drugs in Southern Pines by a soldier (see separate story), it was a long but fairly routine session.

The ladies were welcomed by Robert Henderson; response was given by Mrs. Kimes Blake.

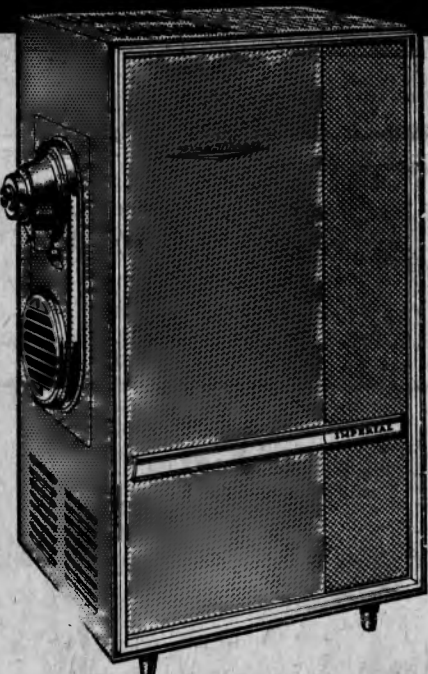
CHICKEN SUPPER TO BE SPONSORED ON SATURDAY

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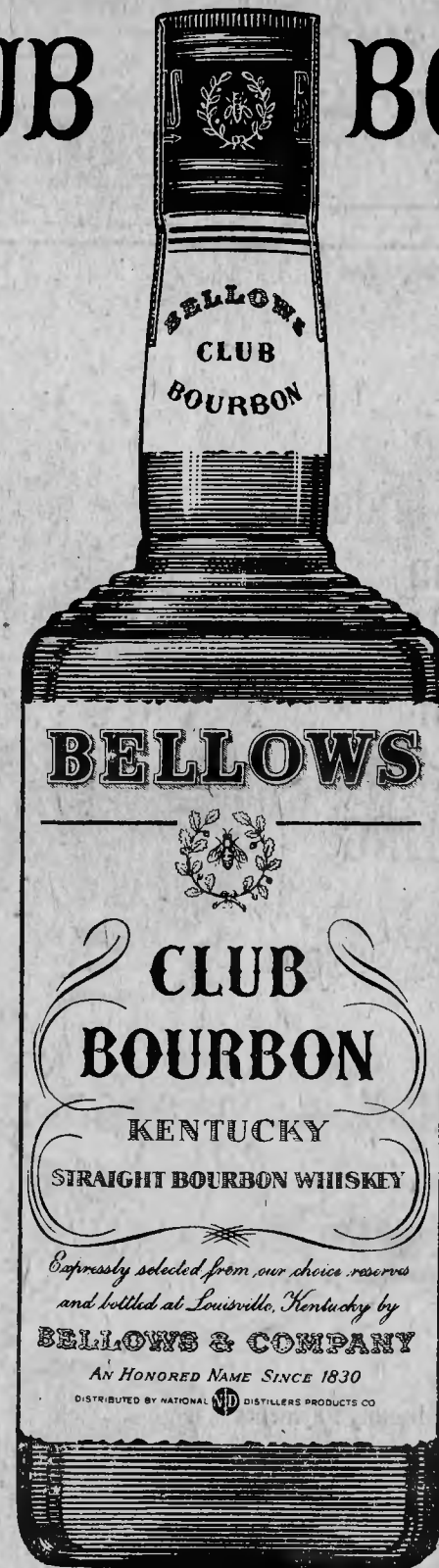
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
