

### Vance Packard to Open Series of Concerts, Lectures at St. Andrews

A lecture by social critic Vance Packard will open the St. Andrews Presbyterian College concert-lecture series for 1961-62 on Monday, October 30, at 8 p. m. in the Laurinburg National Guard Armory.

A limited number of season tickets for the series will be available to the public on Monday, October 23, and thereafter until the supply is exhausted. They can be purchased between 8:30 a. m. and 4 p. m., in the college business office, Room 122, in the Liberal Arts and Science Building.

Mr. Packard, author of "The Hidden Persuaders," a 1957 best-seller which was translated into nine languages, pioneered in alerting the American public to the techniques employed for persuasion in advertising. His book "The Status Seekers," also a best-seller, set forth his findings and exploration of class behavior in America and described present trends.

In addition to Mr. Packard's lecture, the series will include: December 4—lecture by General Carlos P. Romulo, Philippine

minister to Cuba; January 11—concert by Curtis String Quartet; January 19—lecture by William Shirer, foreign correspondent and world affairs analyst; March 8—concert by Aaron Rosand, violinist; and, at a date to be announced, an appearance by Frank Guarrera.

Season tickets will entitle holders to attend the six events. No tickets to individual concerts and lectures will be available to the public.

Ballerina Marina Svetlova and her dance group, scheduled for early November, will present a concert which will be open only to the students, faculty and staff at St. Andrews.
