McCallum described the still as a 102-gallon submarine type. Seized and destroyed were 520 gallons of mash, over 11 gallons three 55-gallon fermenter barrels, pound gas cylinder burner fed by bottled gas, and various tubs and buckets.

All three of the men have court records for liquor offenses, Mc-Callum said.
