Table Winners at Hollywood Bridge Club on Tuesday

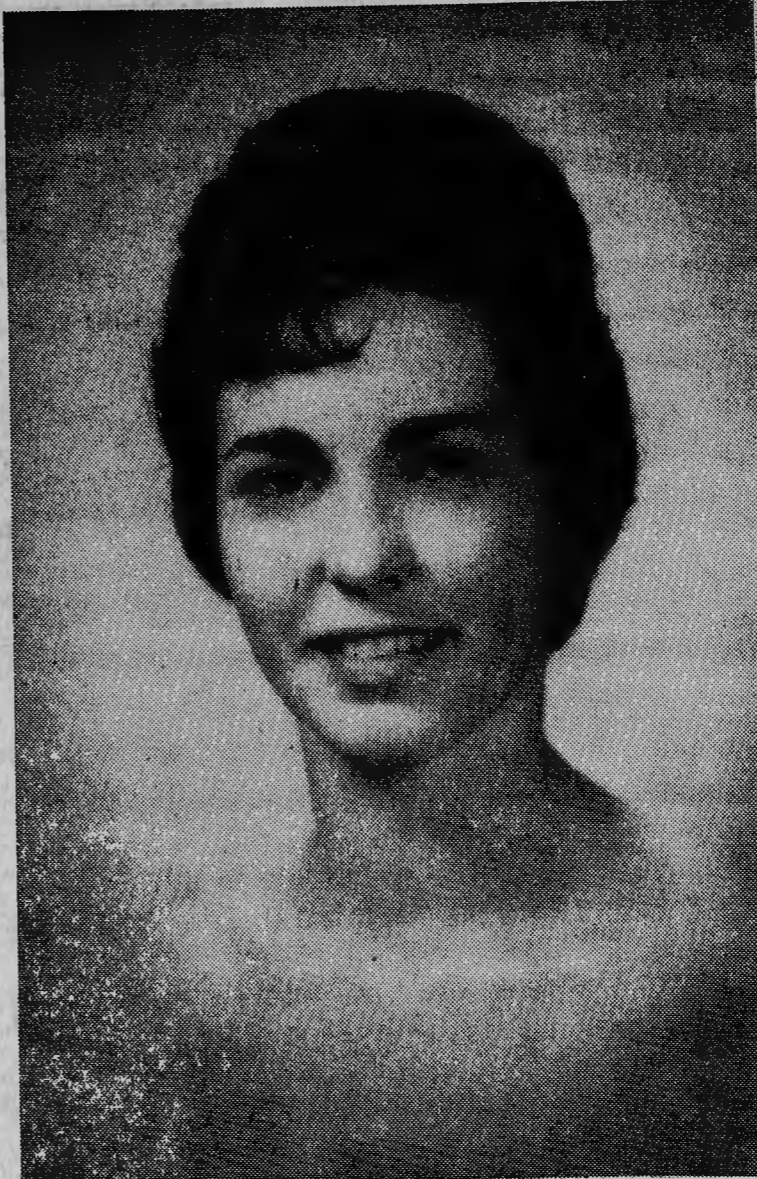

Theme of this year's Southeastern Garden and Flower Show is audience participation and the entire series, to be held February 23-27 in the J. S. Dorton arena in the State Fair Grounds in Raleigh, will be centered around this theme.

In this second annual show, which promises to be even better than last year's highly successful event, there will be 10 large gardens and several smaller ones, expertly designed by landscape architects and planted by leading nurserymen from this and other southeastern states.

Brooker, owner and operator of Landscapes, who had one of the major exhibits in last year's show, has designed and will exhibit this year an 850 square foot outdoor barbecue and dining area, especially suitable to the Sandhills. His design will feature the use of container gardens in an enclosed area.

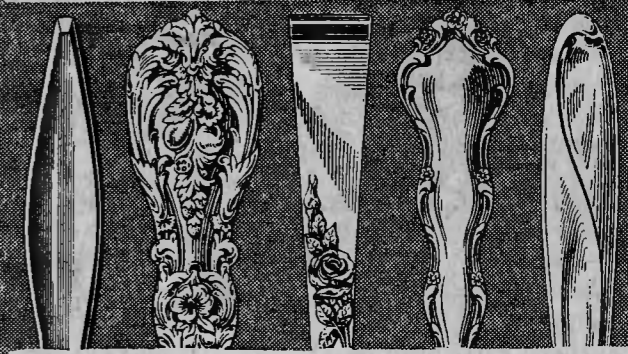

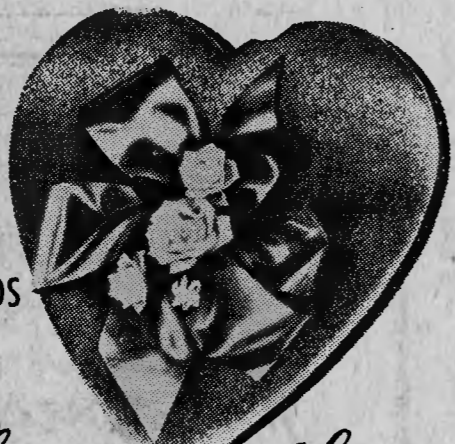
