

### Census Reveals 11,259 Housing Units In Moore With 9,866 of Them Occupied

The 1960 Census of Housing counted 11,259 housing units in Moore County, the Bureau of the Census reports.

Of these—

- 5,650 were in sound condition with all plumbing.
- 9,866 were occupied.
- 6,763 were occupied by owners.
- \$6,300 was the median value of owner-occupied places.
- 3,103 were occupied by renters.
- \$47 was the median gross rent of rented places.
- 7,002 had hot and cold running water.
- 6,992 had flush toilet, bathtub or shower.
- 2,577 had basement.
- 91 were trailer homes.
- 993 households had air conditioning.
- 7,226 had TV, 8,267 radio and 4,467 telephone.
- 6,878 had washing machine and 200 clothes dryer.
- 2,498 had 1 or more home food freezers.
- 6,102 had 1 automobile.
- 1,956 had 2 automobiles.
- 185 had 3 or more automobiles.
