

FORESTRY INCOME

Forestry is the sixth most important source of income to farmers in North Carolina. It contributed \$46 million to farm income during 1960. This is an increase from \$18 million in 1950. A high of \$48 million was reached in 1958, and since then it has leveled off at \$46 million for the past two years. In addition, forestry contributed another \$40 million to the income of land owners who are not classified as farmers.

Vass Meets \$100 Quota in County 4-H Fund Drive

John Baker, Chairman of the Vass 4-H Development Fund drive, has announced that the \$100 quota set for Vass had been met. Mr. Baker gave high praise to those who had helped raise the money and for the persons who had generously contributed to the fund.

George Ross of Eagle Springs, county chairman for the 4-H Development Fund, said that the fund drive is progressing nicely throughout the county and it is hoped that all towns and communities can finish their campaigns by July 1. Eighteen hundred dollars of the \$5,000 Moore County quota has been collected thus far. Most of the towns and

community chairmen have sub-committees who solicit contributions from businesses, industries, individuals and civic organizations. The total quota for towns and communities is \$2,700.

The one-thousand 4-H Club Members in the County are selling "Moore County" auto plates and first aid kits to raise \$1000 for the fund and the remainder of the \$5000 quota will come from contributions from various county-wide organizations.

The 4-H Development Fund is a program of support for 4-H Clubs in those areas which are not supported by tax funds. The money donated will be used on a state level for 4-H Camp improvements, recognition and scholarships for outstanding 4-H Club members and for the International Farm Youth Exchange program.

Many of the historic and beautiful buildings and monuments in Florence and Rome were photographed as backgrounds for the unusual love story.

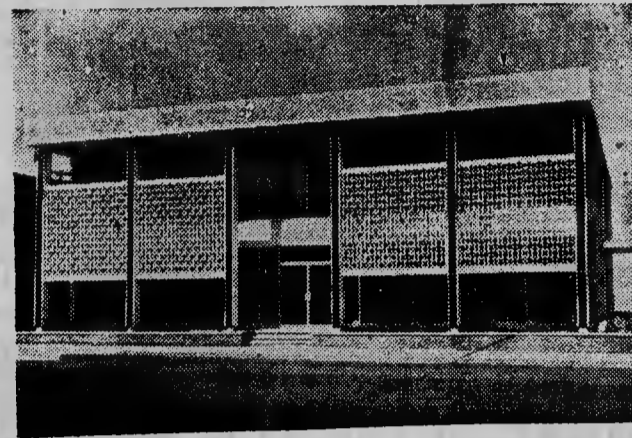
LONGTIME RESIDENT

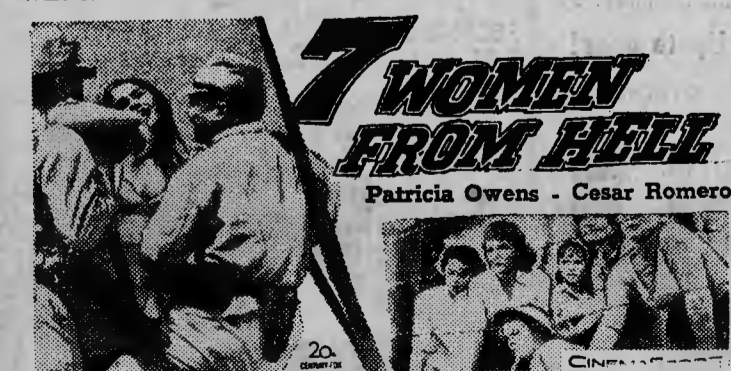
