

**SOUTHERN PINES RECORDER'S COURT**

**Youth Finds Judge Means Business, Gets Road Term for Non-Compliance**

A Route 3, Carthage, youth learned in Southern Pines Recorder's Court last week that Judge W. Harry Fullenwider means what he says in the unusual conditions he imposes when suspending sentence or continuing judgment in cases involving violation of traffic laws.

Donnie Chavis, 19, was tried February 7 in the local court for speeding 70 miles per hour in a 35 zone and reckless driving. He pleaded not guilty but was found guilty and judgment was continued on condition that he walk to his home (an option offered in lieu of a fine) and that he not be in any automobile, except to and from work or on specific errands for his parents, during a period of 30 days.

Before the 30 days had elapsed, however, he was seen by an officer riding in a car with other youths in violation of the conditions laid down by the judge.

In court last week he was sentenced to 30 days on the roads. He entered an appeal to Superior

Court. Judge Fullenwider set bond at \$300. The appeal will be calendared for the next term of Superior Court at Carthage.

Other cases heard in last week's session were:

James Ray Peele, Route 1, Fayetteville, failure to yield right of way, resulting in accident and property damage, found guilty of failure to keep a proper lookout, pay costs and walk a specified distance (in lieu of fine, by choice of defendant); Gary Nelson Frye, assault on female, nol pros with leave on payment of costs; Thomas Stanback, assault on female, not guilty.

Dorothy Warner, vile and profane language, \$10 and costs; Robbie Lee Stover, public drunk, one month in county jail (light work only); George Rogers, Aberdeen, public drunk, one month on roads, suspended sentence in former case to be executed; James Richards, drunk and disorderly, plea of guilty of public drunk accepted, pay the costs; Robert Edward Rast, drunken driving, \$100 fine and costs, stay in town jail until 6 p.m. on day of trial, surrender driver's license for revocation; Ethel M. Jensen, disregarding stop sign, \$5 and costs; Larry Thomas Bennett, Carthage speeding 45 in 35 zone, \$10 and costs.

James M. Jones, Pinebluff, careless and reckless driving resulting in accident, judgment continued on payment of costs; Robert L. O. Steen, Pope Air Force Base, expired license plates, \$1 and costs; Garland F. Stanback, no valid operator's permit, two months on the roads, suspended for two years, not to operate a motor vehicle until license is obtained and presented to the chief of police, \$25 fine and costs.

Hilton Swinnie, Pinehurst, allowing unlicensed person to operate motor vehicle, \$10 and costs; Thomas W. March, Route 1, West End, no valid operator's permit, expired license plate, no liability insurance, possession of 20 per cent wine with seal broken, three months suspended indefinitely on payment of the costs, to walk every place he goes for 60 days, not to operate a motor vehicle until license is obtained and presented to chief of police or the Highway Patrol, not to allow the vehicle in question to be operated until it is properly licensed and insured.
