




Father of Aberdeen **Residents Succumbs**





Town Buys Small Lot Near Mount **Hope Cemetery**

In a short session Tuesday night, the town council authorized Town Manager F. F. (Bud) Rainey to buy for \$100 a small triangular piece of land between the town-owned Mount Hope Cemetery and the No. 1 highway parkway right of way.

The land, described as useless for any practical purpose, was offered to the Town by its former owner, Miss Evelyn Thomas. The town plans to beautify the lot, to improve appearances near the cemetery.

Transfer of certain funds within the budget by the manager was approved by the council, although formal authorization of the proposals was not necessary.

The transfers, said the manager, will be within departments and will not change the total amount budgeted for any department.




