Judy Upole of Lees-McRae College and Karen Farmer of Saint Andrews Presbyterian College were home for their spring holidays with their parents.



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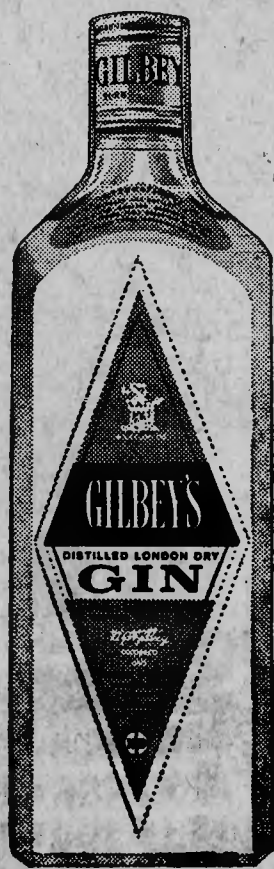
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
