





#### Vaccination Of Dogs For Rabies Going On

Clinics for vaccination of dogs against rabies started in Moore County Monday, to run through Thursday, April 25. All dogs four months old or older must be vaccinated. A charge of \$1.50 is made at the clinics, less than the cost when the vaccine is privately given.

The clinic list appears elsewhere in today's paper. It was not made available to The Pilot for publication until after the clinics had begun. However, residents of the county can take their dogs to any of the clinics listed.
