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Oct. 29 Date Is **Favored For Big Moore Bond Vote**

Only technicalities remain before official approval is given by Moore County commissioners, at their September meeting Tuesday, to an election on a \$4 million bond issue for a community college and public schools.

The commissioners unofficially endorsed the proposal Friday at a special meeting with the county board of education, which submitted it with their own approval, added to those of the Southern Pines and Pinehurst boards. It was sent on immediately to the New York bond attorneys to start drawing up the legal forms.

In regular meeting Tuesday night, the board of education instructed its attorney, W. D. Sabiston, to draw up the formal petition, which will be added to legal drafts of the New York bond attorneys for official action and signatures of the county commissioners Tuesday.

This will start the machinery moving through the necessary advertising and other steps to an election date approximately two months from now.

While it will be up to the commissioners to confirm the date, said Jere McKeithen, chairman of the county board of education, Tuesday, October 29, is the earliest possible one for hold-ing the vote while complying with all necessary legalities, and is the one suggested by his board.
