Dr. McMillan On **Education Board**; Pollock Resigns

Meeting in regular session Tuesday night at town hall, the town council accepted the resignation of R. F. Hoke Pollock from the local board of education and appointed Dr. R. M. McMillan, physician who has practiced here for nearly 17 years, to fill the vacancy. The term of service ex-

pires in June, 1964.

Mr. Pollock had been on the board since September, appointed to fill the vacancy left by the resignation of J. E. Sandlin who moved to Lumberton.

A letter of resignation from Mr. Pollock, attorney with the firm, Pollock and Fullenwider, stated that since the board of education "has given some consideration to the acquisition of certain lands owned by a client of the firm of which I am a member, it is only proper that I should not participate in any action taken by the board relating to such land acquisition, without the mutual consent of all parties. To avoid any conflict of interest, I offer my
