Though unable to come to this country for Mr. Kennedy's funeral, Mr. Horn recently donated his services for about two months in Washington, assisting the U. S. Government in its program on Foreign Aid.

During his visit here, Garfield and his parents joined his brother, Herbert Horn and his wife and family for dinner in Laurinburg. Herbert is head of the Piano Department at St. Andrews College there.

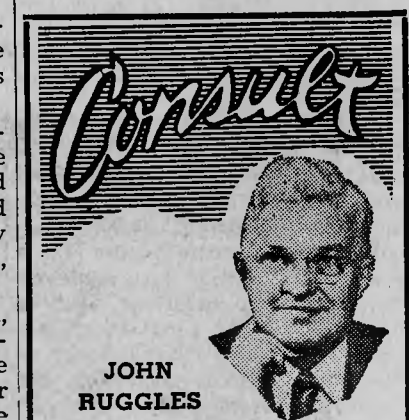
During the business session, the members voted to send a contribution to the Woodmen Circle Home in Sherman, Tex., for Christmas. The money will be used to spread cheer among its members.

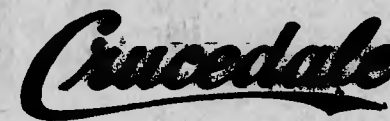
