In Sandhills

The evening grosbeaks are back would like to hear from anyone who sights the flock or any of its members.

She spotted one of these instresting birds at the Lovejoy home a couple of weeks ago, and birdwatcher Lovejoy himself noted a visitation of 16 of them Monday morning of this week.

A dozen were sighted recently at Niagara. Miss Wintyen wants to know who else sees them, and when, and asks that bird watchers make notes and send them or telephone them to her, so that she may locate their time and area of activity as nearly as possible. They will be here until spring. Miss Wintyen also reminds bird lovers that the birds need the help of their friends in getting along through the freezing weather. Food should be put out for them. The grosbeaks especially like sunflower seed, which can be bought at most grocery stores.
