

Aberdeen Fire Chief M. J Muse attributed the fire to sparks from cutting torches of a wrecking crew which had been work-

The roof of the structure caved in, but the two-feet-thick walls, with an insulating cork interior, remained standing. The building is owned by the City Products Co. of Chicago and was used, until a few years ago, to provide ice for fruit and vegetable cars. Further details of the fire are in a story on page 11.


