ABC Officer's Hunch Pays Off: 10 Jars Whiskey

ABC Officer Edward Floyd of Aberdeen stopped a car on a hunch last Friday about dusk, and the hunch paid off. In the trunk of the car he found 10 half gallon jars of white whiskey. The driver, Charlie Gibson, Negro, 37, of Hoffman Rt. 1 was arrested and placed under \$100 bond by a JP, to appear in Moore Recorder's Court March 2 on charges of unlawful possession of illicit whiskey for sale, and transporting. His 1957 Buick was impounded and placed in storage. Floyd said he wasn't sure just why he stopped Gibson—he had stopped him before, and never found anything in his car. This time, though, the officer said he wasn't surprised by what he found—only "surprised that there wasn't more." The search and arrest took place on US Highway 1 in the Drowning Creek area, just after Gibson had crossed the line from Richmond County into Moore.
