Featured speaker will be the Rt. Rev. Edward G. Longid, Suffragan Bishop of the Philippine Islands. Educated in the United States during his college years, Bishop Longid has had a distinguished career in his ministry to people in the Philippines, and is in the United States to tell of the work of the Episcopal Church in his native land.

His appearance before the Churchwomen of Emmanuel will be open to all in the area interested in Christian endeavors in the

Bishop Longid was born October 18, 1908, in Sagada and attended St. Andrew's Theological Seminary. He became a deacon in January, 1939, and a priest in June. 1941.

From 1939 to 1940 he served as deacon-in-charge of All Saints' Mission, Bontoc, the Philippines. The following two years he was minister-in-charge of Tadian and Outstations. From 1942 - 1951, Bishop-elect Longid was priest-incharge of the Mission of St. Mary the Virgin in Sagada. During the next nine years (1951-60), he was priest-in-charge of St. Michael and All Angels', Tadian, Kayan, the Philippines.

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
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
