#### Farmers Must Keep Good Records Of **Both Regular And Part-Time Workers**

cial security numbers. A farm worker's wages are subject to social security tax if he is paid as much as \$150 during the year or if the worker is employed on 20 or more days during the year and paid on a time basis

-by the hour, day, or week. Under the law, the employer is held responsible for both the employee and employer tax for social security purposes. It is apparent that a record of the time worked and the wages paid is necessary, Jones said.

A good system used by many employers is to insist on seeing the social security card before paying the first week's wages,

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

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
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
