Moubry will present his budget message Thursday at a special 4 p.m. meeting of the commissioners. The meeting will be devoted entirely to the budget message, and it is not expected that action will be taken on any of the budget requests.

Along with his message, attempted armed robbery at Moubry will present budget requests from the remaining departments, agencies, and offices usually funded by the county. He will also present his recommendations for each agency, except the public schools and Sandhills Community College.

Aberdeen To Keep Tax Rate

If the Aberdeen Town Board of Commissioners adopts the \$1 million budget tentatively approved Monday night, the municipality will retain its pre-sent 75-cent tax rate for another vear.

The board did give approval to increases in the water and sewer rates, to go into effect July 1. At the special meeting Monday

night the board voted to hold the legally required budget public hearing on June 29 at 7:30 p.m. in town hall. In the meantime copies of the proposed budget will be available for inspection in town hall.

Even operating at the same level as last year, with no new programs added, is going to require an increase of at least 10 percent, Lee said.

The cost of utilities, school roof repairs and teachers salaries have all been increased in the proposed budget presented to the commissioners last Monday. All these increases would be required to maintain the school program as is. "It won't take the same dollars to stand still," Lee

A 44 percent budget increase has been requested.

Also proposed in the schools' budget are salaries for seven new health and physical education teachers, two cultural arts positions and four media assistants, the latter of which are required for evaluation by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools.

The board has also recommended that \$31,000 be appropriated to begin gradually replacing the revenue generated by required student fees, which bring in an average of \$93,000 per year, so that in three years students will not be required to pay fees.


