

GEN. HARRISON DEAD.

Ex-President's Death Was Quiet and Painless at His Home in Indianapolis.

Indianapolis, Ind., March 13.—General Benjamin J. Harrison died at 4:45 this afternoon without regaining consciousness. His death was quiet and painless, there being a gradual sinking until the end came, which was marked by a single gasp for breath as life departed from the body. The relatives, with a few exceptions, and several of his old and tried friends were at the former President's bedside when he passed away. The General's condition was so bad this morning, after a sleepless night that the attending physicians understood that the end could not be far off and all bulletins sent out from the sick room were to this effect, so that the family and friends were prepared when the final blow came.

News of the death spread quickly through the city, and several of the more intimate friends at once hurried to the Harrison residence. The word was flashed from the bulletins of all the newspapers, and thus communicated to the people on their way home in the evening. The announcement produced the greatest sorrow. Within a few moments, the flags on all the public buildings and most of the down town business blocks were hoisted at half-mast, and other outward manifestations of mourning were made.

None of General Harrison's children were present at his death. Neither Colonel Russell Harrison nor Mrs. McKee had reached the city, although both were on their way. Elizabeth, General Harrison's little daughter, had been taken from the sick room by her nurse before the end came.
