Death of Mrs. Jenkins.

The Raleigh News and Observer of August 31, contains the following notice of the death of Mrs. J. W. Jenkins:

"Yesterday news was received in the city of the death of Mrs. J. W. Jenkins, wife of Rev. J. W. Jenkins, Superintendent of the Methodist Orphanage of this city, at Leasburg. Mrs. Jenkins died suddenly Thursday night from blood poisoning.

"Death occurred at the home place at Leasburg and the funeral will take place there to-day. Her sickness was not considered dangerous, but Mr. Jenkins was at her bedside when she passed away.

Mrs. Jenkins was a consistent member of the Methodist church and an earnest worker in it. She has given freely for church purposes and lately there was received from her \$800 for the Methodist Orphanage. She was about 52 years old and leaves no children. Mrs. Jenkins was born in Caswell county and was a sister of Mr. Charles Yarborough, formerly a representative from Caswell. She was first married to a Mr. Garrett and after his death was married to Rev. J. W. Jenkins in 1894.

Mr. Jenkins lived in Smithfield during 1899 and had many friends in this section who will regret that this good woman has passed away.
