NORFOLK AND SOUTHERN RY.

Consolidation of the Railroad Properties in Eastern North Carolina into One Big System, Means More Development, More Building, More Prosperity for the Sections Through Which the Lines Will Traverse.

The consolidation of the rail way properties in Eastern Carolina into one big system is of usual importance to the people, G. W. Starling. for it means more devolment, more building, and greater prosperty for the section through which the lines traverse. Ordinarily, it is not good for the public to have one corporation in control of all the milesize, but in this case it is altogether different and it is essential that all be linked together if we hope to obtain the best results. The re-or-ganized company will be known as the Norfolk & Southern. Mr. Gannon, the president, is one of the best railroad men in the South. He understands conditions, he understands our people and he will work inighfully and hard for the appuilding of North Carolina and particularly the Eastern section where the road is operated. When completed the Raleigh & Pamlico will be a part of the system, and the State capital, therefore, will be in close touch with a territory difficult to reach heretofore for lack of proper facilities.

The Norfolk & Southern will have a total mileage of 633. Locally, there is the belief that it is backed by the Rocketellers. though it is not easy to say whether or not that report is true It does not matter so long as a first-class service is provided and so long as the patrons are treated fairly. The Atlantic & North Carolina is included, of course. The validity of the lease is before the Supreme Court, but there is no reason to believe that it will be annulled. So there is plain sailing ahead for the big system.

Perhaps the most gigantic undertaking of the company will be the erection of a bridge, five and one half miles long, across the Albemarle sound. It will cost more than half a million dollars. It is a wise investment, however, and when completed there will be a steel trestle instead of a poor ferry President Gannon has not been making wild or idle promises. He is practical to a degree, and he will do just what he says. North Carolina is deeply interested in the success and welfare of the Norfolk & Southern and its growth will not cease with the building of a bridge and the purchase of lines already constructed. There is a great future for the company.-Raleigh Times

When the next Congress meets, the youngest Senator to take his seat in that body will be now Governor Beekham.of Kentucky. That will do to think over. When in madness and folly Governor Goebel, of K-ntucky, was shot down by mountain bullies and desperadoes six years ago, this young man Beckham, then a boy, was Lieutenant Governor and by virtue of that fact came

to be Governor. So soberly and wisely did he manage affairs that when his accidental term was done, he was re-elected Governor on his own account by a greatly increased majority. Now it chances that Kentucky is a whiskey State and many of its towns were "wide open" on Sundays. The young Governor said Sunday should be respected and that saloons on that day must shut up-or they would be shut up seven days, instead of one, in the week. Soberness backed him up and then instead of becoming unpopular from spreading such a sentiment Beckham became popular, for he was honest and sober and sound.

This fall, when entering the race for United States Senator. he went before the people in the primary on his temperance record. He plead for temperance on the hustings and from the stump, and his nomination, equal in Kentucky to election, is the vindication of his efforts and a distinct triumph for temperance and sobriety even in this whiskey-manufacturing and whiskey-consuming State. Gradually the cause of soberness, temperance and order triumphs. Let us thank God and take courage.-Christian Sun.


