Make Attack In Force and Capture Eight Thousand Men. Fighting All Along the Line. Southwest of Brezzany Strongly Fortified Positions of Germans Taken in Places After the Most Stubborn Fighting.

RUSSIANS RENEW THE FIGHT.

Petrograd, July 2 .- The brilliant 83,234.12 Russian advance, the news of which 4,003.23 has sent a wave of rejoicing through 2,250.00 the entire country, was led by War Minister Kerenski in person. For the last four days the war

15,000.00 minister has been continuously at the 6,000.00 front, spending every effort to urge (D) the troops to advance. He finally rode to the front line trenches and placing himself at the head of the troops gave N the order to advance. 912.28

The spectacle of the popular war minister on the field line accomplished what oratory had failed to do and the 29,733.64 Russian line swept forward into the 1,449.71 German trenches. 2,000.00

"Western (Russian) front: In the direction of Kovel (Volhynia) in the region of Rudkasitovichskyaya, our 1,710.00 25,149.23 scouts under command of four officers, after destroying the wire entangle-ments by mines, penetrated the enemy's trenches, killed some of their occupants and captured a number of prisoners. According to the testimony of prisoners the Austrians knew of our attack from two deserters, Senior Non-Commissioned Officer Karsokin and Private Kolotumov. Beaufort, S. C., June 29.-The South Carolina Press Association, Ż after a spirited debate today, tabled a resolution by a vote of 23 to 12 favoring bone dry prohibition by congress Z as a war measure. That such a resolution be adopted was requested by J. K. Breedin, State superintendent of Z the Sooth Carolina Anti-Saloon league. The press association took the position that the matter was not a war measure and that no action should be taken.
