Mr. Hoover emphasizes the great need of ships, wheat and hogs. The wheat surplus in the United States is put at 80,000,000 bushels, with 150,000,000 bushels surplus in Canada. Mr. Hoover urges the Amer- 15 ican people to practice such economy in wheat consumption that we can spare 150,000,000 bushels more to help feed the allies. They need to have 577,700,000 bushels to give them their normal supplies. It is our duty to help all we can.

President Wilson gave his full endorsement of woman suffrage as an immediate issue in every State in an address before a delegation of 100 leaders of the New York State suffrage party who called at the White House last Thursday.
