The Children Can Help. The raking and hauling of forest leaves and wood mold is not a difficult undertaking. The raking into piles may be done by the smaller children or by the grown-ups during spare time and can be hauled between now and planting time. Wood mold spread upon wheat during the next three or four weeks will largely increase the yield, according to the quantity used. Wood mold and leaves spread upon land that is to be planted in cotton, corn and other crops will very greatly Increase yields and will render more effective the fertilizers used. Haufing of leaves and wood mold should be continued during spare time even after the planting season of cotton and corn, being worked into the ground during the cultivation of the crop. On wheat and other grain the results will not only be seen in the increased production of grain, but in the increased production of hay or other crop which follows.

A \$25,000,000 Increase.

Agricultural experts have estimated that the production of food and feed crops in North Carolina could be increased \$25,000,000 this year by the utilization by farmers of this opportunity for increasing the fertility of their soil.
