



# **RED CROSS MADE OFFICIAL** WAR FILM DISTRIBUTOR

The American Red Cross has been designated by the government as the official and exclusive distributor of the United States official war picturesboth motion pictures and stereopticon slides-and likewise the sole distributor in this country of all official French war pictures hereafter released except those pictures which are distributed through the news weeklies.

In the Southern Division, comprising Georgia, Florida, the two Carolinas and Tennessee, the Bureau of Publicity will handle these pictures and all requests for same, whether by chapters or by motion picture theaters. must be made to the publicity director. There are already on hand at the national headquarters in Washington five motion picture films, two multiple reel and three single reel pictures, and two sets of stereopticon slides which may be had in either black and white or in colors. The Southern division has just placed an order for these films and slides, and as soon as they arrive in Atlanta they will be offered to Chapters throughout the division at a small rental.

These pictures show various scenes and activities in France and elsewhere in Europe, and should be most interesting to the people of the United States. Some of them picture war activities and others the work of the Red Cross in Europe.

The United States official pictures are taken by the Signal Corps, Photographic division, of the United States Army. The French official pictures are taken by the Cinematographic and Photographic Division of the French Army.


