

**Iturbide.**—By way of New Orleans and Norfolk, we have intelligence from Mexico some few days later than the news in our last received via Havana and Baltimore. The particulars of the landing of Iturbide at Soto La Maria, substantially, are not only repeated, but the rumor of his having been seized and summarily executed, at first not credited, though now confirmed through other channels, may be considered as highly probable. Should it indeed prove true, that the career of the Ex-emperor has thus terminated, the fate of Iturbide measurably will resemble as well that of Napoleon as Murat. With the resolution of the former to throw himself upon the shores of a country from which he had been expelled by the authorities, trusting to the feeling of the soldiery and people in his favor, but without his good fortune, he has met the unhappy destiny of the latter. Should the repose of Mexico, and the stability of her Republican Government, be purchased by the death of a selfish adventurer, the cost we should certainly not consider extravagant.—*Petersburg Int.*

[Subsequent accounts state that Iturbide was executed on the 19th July, by the local authorities of San Antonio de Padilla, in conformity to the decree of the Mexican Congress; and that a pension of \$8000 has been decreed to the wife and family of Iturbide, but they are forbidden to reside in the republic.]

It is a well known fact, that the Methodist community is greatly agitated, upon questions of vital importance to the peace and prosperity of their church. Such a state of things call loudly upon every friend of religion, to enquire into the causes which produce this excitement, and to labour for the restoration of harmony, and the preservation of brotherly love. To be prepared, however, to perform a becoming part in this important work, it is necessary to enter upon a calm and dispassionate consideration of the subjects in dispute. Men who do not think more highly of themselves than they ought to think, will feel no difficulty in admitting the truth of this position; for it is impossible for any man wisely to estimate his own opinions, when they differ from those of other men, until he shall have first subjected them to a respectful and scrupulous comparison with the opinions of those who are opposed to him. With a hope that this highly important undertaking will be more generally attempted, the committee chosen by a respectable number of ministers and members in the Methodist Episcopal Church, assembled

from different parts of the United States, in the city of Baltimore, offer proposals for publishing a new periodical work, entitled "The Mutual Rights of the Preachers and Members of the Methodist Episcopal Church."

In performing the duty thus assigned them, they feel no motive abstract from a deep concern for the preservation of the unity of Methodism in the bonds of peace; and they entertain an unshaken confidence, that if the Methodist people have a suitable opportunity to compare the arguments that are adduced on both sides of the great question of reform, that permanent harmony may be established among them. Without this, they are equally confident that the difference of sentiment which now so extensively prevails, will accelerate an equally extensive alienation of affection, and ultimately terminate in great and ruinous secessions from the church.

The publication which they contemplate, is specially intended to realize to the church, a practical understanding of the title which it assumes. This can be done only through the medium of a free press; and it is hoped that those who are unfriendly to the above named object, will, nevertheless, for the sake of their own respectability, perceive the propriety of promoting its circulation; especially when we hereby give notice, that any paper which is intended, dispassionately, to set forth the arguments on their side of the question, shall be inserted. Indeed, a friendly attitude towards this attempt, and the preservation of brotherly love towards those engaged in it, we consider our privilege to claim at their hands, as a duty which they, as Christians and men, owe to the community.

To remove every reasonable difficulty out of the way, we promise to exclude from the pages of the "Mutual Rights," every thing calculated to give personal offence. Nay, more, we shall take pleasure in acknowledging the personal virtues of our opponents; shall gladly sit at their feet while they give us instruction in righteousness; and shall be careful to maintain all due deference for their opinions; whilst, with firmness and impartiality, we shall expose the defects and excesses which unavoidably grow out of the polity of our church.

It is intended to make the periodical paper now proposed, embrace, not only those subjects of investigation alluded to above, but also a variety of other matter, both amusing and instructive. A compendious narrative of the proceedings of the General Conference of 1824, will also be found in its pages.
