The Emperor Nicholas was to set ofl for the army in about a week after that day. In the mean time the Turkish governnent is increasing its army at Ad rianople, and strengthening the forts of the Dardanelles.
These are warlike operations fut on the other hand, it is ren dered quite certain by the advices from Viemna, as late as the 27 th March, bringing news from Constantinople to the 4th of that monhth, that Turkey had concludd a three months' armistic with Greece.

The Season.-By accounts from Alabama and Georgia, we learn that on the 5th and 6th ult. severe fosts were experienced in the South, the consequences of which had been very serious. In some instances the Corn which was planted on the 1st of March, and of good growing size, was killed into the ground-Wheat 18 inches high perished to the root and all the fruit that had bloomed was entirely destroyed. According to letters, great scarcity of read stuffs was apprehended in hat quarter.-Pct. Int.

Cotton.-It will be perceived, y the extracts which we publish o-day from Liverpool, that a small increase of price has been ealized on American Cottons; and this increase appears to be founded, not upon whim or speculation, but upon a cause which is likely to operate for some time to come, and to effect a still greater advance. We mean, the evident deficiency of the last year's crop in this country. This deficiency is estimated, and to every appearance, pretty correctly, at from 250,000 to 300,000 bales, viz: in South-Carolina and Georgia, according to a statement lately published in this paper, 156,$000 ; \mathbf{N}$. Carolina and Virginia, 30,000 shipments from New-Orleans, as stated by letters from that place,
estimate, will show a total of near 300,000 bales. When this fact i known in Liverpool, it is not unreasonable to expect a rise of two
or three pence a pound on Cot-on.--Fayetteville Obs,
