Foreign.—Liverpool papers to the 8th ult. have been received at New-York. They contain nothing decisive respecting the affairs of the East. Markets remained stationary. The following extracts from the Evening Post, embrace the substance of the political intelligence.

The London Courier of the 5th states, that the Russian troops had not passed the Pruth at the last advices, but that the day fixed for the passage was the 12th of April. The Emperor Nicholas was to set off for the army in about a week after that day. In the mean time the Turkish government is increasing its army at Adrianople, and strengthening the forts of the Dardanelles.

These are warlike operations: but on the other hand, it is rendered quite certain by the advices from Vienna, as late as the 27th March, bringing news from Constantinople to the 4th of that month, that Turkey had concluded a three months' armistice with Greece.

Congress.—Our Washington City papers are to the 10th inst. The day of adjournment was not yet fixed. On the 3d inst. the committee on adjournment reported to the House, that there were yet nearly three hundred bills, which it would be necessary to act on at the present session if the time would allow. We have gathered the following interesting items from various sources:

The Raleigh Star of the 8th inst. contains a letter to the Editors, from a Representative in Congress from this State, from which we extract the following:—"On yesterday (29th ult.) the bill from this House, making appropriations for the Indian Department for the present year, was amended in the Senate so as to include North-Carolina in a treaty which is contemplated to be held with the Cherokee Indians, to extinguish their titles to land within the limits of Georgia. The powers therefore of the commissioners will be extended (should the amendment be agreed to by this House) to the extinguishment of Indian titles within North-Carolina as well as Georgia, which gives a hope of effecting that object so desirable to our State, and of so much importance to our interest. To the vigilance of our Senators, together with the aid of Judge White, of Tennessee, we are mainly indebted for this salutary amendment. The bill was also amended in the Senate upon the motion of Mr. Benton, so as to refund to North-Carolina the sum of \$22,000, which she paid for reservations of land taken by Indians under the treaty of 1819."

In the Senate, on the 27th ult. the bill for the relief of "certain Officers of the Revolutionary army," was passed by a vote of 26

to 20. By this bill provision is made for full pay for the officers not now on the pension list, from March 3, 1826, during the residue of their lives.

The Telegraph of the 10th inst. says: "In the House yesterday, the bill authorizing a subscription of one million of dollars, to the stock of the Chesapeake and Ohio Canal, was read a third time, and after a short debate, which was terminated by a call for the previous question, the bill was passed by a vote of 107 to 71."

The Newbern Sentinel of the 10th inst. says: "We have been favored with the perusal of a letter from the Hon. John H. Bryan, our Representative in Congress, in which he states, that the House of Representatives had passed the bill appropriating \$20,000 for improving the navigation at Ocracoke Inlet, and \$10,000 for building a Light Boat to be stationed at the Point of Marsh. Mr. Bryan thinks that both appropriations will be sanctioned by the Senate. Mr. Bryan, we learn has been appointed by Congress to attend the approaching Examination of the Students at West Point. He will not, therefore return home before the middle of June."

Newbern, May 10.—At the late term of Beaufort Superior Court, Judge Strange presiding, two negro men, indicted for burglary, were found guilty and sentenced to be executed on the 7th of next month. At the same term, James and Ross Hanrahan, brothers, and residents of the town of Washington, convicted of assault and battery, were sentenced to twelve months imprisonment in the Newbern Jail—the former, at the expiration of that time, to give security in the sum of \$2000, for his good behavior.—*Sent.*

The Season.—By accounts from Alabama and Georgia, we learn that on the 5th and 6th ult. severe frosts were experienced in the South, the consequences of which had been very serious. In some instances the Corn which was planted on the 1st of March, and of good growing size, was killed into the ground—Wheat 18 inches high perished to the root; and all the fruit that had bloomed was entirely destroyed. According to letters, great scarcity of bread stuffs was apprehended in that quarter.—*Pct. Int.*

Cotton.—It will be perceived, by the extracts which we publish to-day from Liverpool, that a small increase of price has been realized on American Cottons; and this increase appears to be founded, not upon whim or speculation, but upon a cause which is likely to operate for some time to come, and to effect a still greater advance. We mean, the evident deficiency of the last year's crop in this country. This deficiency is estimated, and to every appearance, pretty correctly, at from 250,000 to 300,000 bales, viz: in South-Carolina and Georgia, according to a statement lately published in this paper, 156,000; N. Carolina and Virginia, 30,000; shipments from New-Orleans, as stated by letters from that place,

60,000. In addition to this, the deficiency of shipments from Mobile, of which we have seen no estimate, will show a total of near 300,000 bales. When this fact is known in Liverpool, it is not unreasonable to expect a rise of two or three pence a pound on Cotton.—*Fayetteville Obs.*
